

**Location of operation:** Faysal, Giza District, Cairo.

**Time of implementation:** 1.07.2024 - 31.05.2025

**Objective:** Drafted and distributed clear and understandable information on recent Egyptian immigration laws, making it accessible and easy for the refugee Sudanese community to comprehend.

**Activities:**

- **A1:** Evidence-based legal research was conducted in collaboration with refugee lawyers and researchers from the American University in Cairo, building on previous work and expert interviews.
- **A2:** 30 “Know Your Rights” legal information sessions were delivered to Sudanese community members in Cairo to address evolving legal challenges. The sessions reached 1,200 beneficiaries, primarily women, over the course of the project.
- **A3:** Data on participants’ legal needs and concerns were collected during the sessions and analysed to inform future programming. This process led to the production of a legal information booklet distributed in print and prepared for online publication.
- **A4:** Research findings and session data were used to develop and disseminate information graphics in collaboration with legal and media experts. These materials were shared at community centers and prepared for wider distribution through digital platforms, with the project booklet included as an annex.

**Achievements:**

- **Active participation:** The “Know Your Rights” legal counseling sessions for Sudanese migrants, sharing accessible and current legal information, reached 1,200 beneficiaries across 30 sessions.
- **Advocacy and inclusion:** Provided accurate and up-to-date information on laws affecting migrants and refugees through 1701 graphic booklets printed and 30 social media posts.
- **Empowerment and leadership:** Supported Sudanese migrants, refugees, and asylum seekers through public statements, requests to authorities, and clear legal updates, empowering them to make informed decisions.

**Challenges**

The increased detention and deportation of Sudanese refugees and migrants, including those with legal status, has heightened insecurity and uncertainty. Meanwhile, ongoing changes to Egyptian migration laws have further complicated access to protection and made planning and support efforts more challenging.
